Greetings and happy Spring to you all. Spring fills us with fresh optimism and joy that we are alive and well. The Maple trees are sprouting new green leaves, the daffodils are doing their happy dance as they awaken from the winter slumber. As artists we see things, differently. We notice the difference in light. We are creators, we have inward urgings to express our creativity. For some, it is not even a choice; we must create. To do so satisfies our soul and gives solace to our spirit.

Spring also brings with her the Spring Art Show. Over 60 local artists are showing and selling their work Saturday and Sunday, **May 3-4** at the Redmond High School commons. We have included area high school aged students with many choosing to show their work. Every type of art media will be shown.



Dry Canyon Arts Association has been around over 20 years. Since we started creating opportunities for local artists to show and sell their work our membership numbers have swelled. Our first art show was in December of 2020 in a large tent next to General Duffy's. 12 artists showed their work. In the spring of 2021, when High Desert Music Hall opened, we held an art show in May. 20 artists enjoyed the warmth and ambiance of the first Spring Art Show. Soon we added the Fall Art Show. Bursting at the seams, we moved the shows to the Redmond High School. Our showing artists numbers have kept up and the attendance from the public has been great. Over 45 local artists will be joined by about 20 high school artist's in bringing their artwork for public viewing during this years Spring Art Show.

The art raffle is back with donations from artists going to support visual art education in the elementary schools in the Redmond School District. This serves 3,000 kids. We call the fundraising project Jumpstart Art. Dry Canyon Arts Association donated over \$70,000 to this important mission for the current school year. Now we are working for next year. Without our efforts to do this there would be no visual art education for the youngest students. Your help matters, a lot. Art, or rather, creativity, can change lives when it is offered and available. Donations can also be made through the web site.

#### COMING SOON!

Dry Canyon Art Association is pleased, strike that, we are over the moon, to announce that plans are proceeding in the creation of a community arts center, the Dry Canyon Community Art Center. It has long been the vision, stretching back to the founders in 2004, of the local arts community to have a place, a physical place that we can call our own. Thru the generosity of a local art patron and the diligent work of a committee of people giving time and talents, that dream is about to be realized. A lease on a building in a perfect location is soon to be signed. (Please do not disturb the current occupants of the building). DCAA will initially occupy



3,500 sq ft which will be expanded by another 1,500 sq ft in 18 months. Interior renovations are scheduled to begin August 1<sup>st</sup> with a hoped for soft opening on November 1<sup>st</sup> in time for a grand opening during the November First Friday Art Walk on November 7<sup>th</sup>.

You might ask, what's an art center compared to a gallery? A gallery shows art works and can be as small as a cubby hole. An art center takes more square footage. In our case, with 3,500 sq ft, we will have plenty of room for several galleries, a gift shop and several classrooms. The recent survey conducted by COCC students of local residents indicated that art instruction will be highly valued.

The facility planning is mostly complete. As much work as possible will be done by member volunteers with several experienced people working as supervisors. During the March members meeting over 25 people signed up to volunteer their time and talents to create this outstanding addition to the community. It is estimated that the cost of the interior improvements will be about \$75,000. With your financial support we hope to open The Art Center debt free. Donations specifically for use on the Art Center can be made thru the web site: <a href="https://www.drycanyonarts.org/donate">https://www.drycanyonarts.org/donate</a> every donation helps us put this together. Donations will also be sought from the greater Redmond community. This is truly a grassroots community effort.

Operations planning will begin soon. The planning committee acknowledged that we do not have to reinvent the wheel as we know very little about operating an art center. It was discovered that many small communities in rural Oregon have art centers. A questionnaire was designed and sent to many of these art centers with most happy to advise us on what has worked for them. Some, such as Klamath Art Association, having been operating since 1946, have many years of experience. We will covet their advice and willingness to help us be successful.

Classes for people of all ages and experience, or lack of it, are envisioned. Member artists as well as other teaching artists will be encouraged to host classes in the facility. Call for artists to show work in the galleries will go out frequently with the changeover of art and artists to happen every few months. This is done so that we encourage a constant flow of visitors and shoppers. Same will hold true for the gift shop where shoppers will find your art cards, jewelry and other member made items available for sale.

All of this takes your support, both in terms of volunteering your time and talent now and ongoing into the operations. Of course your financial contribution will enable us to create a great Dry Canyon Community Art Center. We have a once in a lifetime opportunity to create a lasting arts community, will you join with us and support it? As DCAA is an Oregon Cultural Trust listed non profit 501c3, all donations are tax deductible. Our current locations include Bend Dermatology (Redmond); Birdies Brow & Description Source; Redmond Sr. Center; and St. Charles Hospital.




# ARTIST OF THE MONTH

# Stephanie Cissna: Plein Air and Intentional Serenity

Raised in the urban sprawl of Los Angeles, Stephanie grew up surrounded by city life. "As a child I was always drawing, always creating, and I knew I wanted to be an artist," she recalls. "My parents valued art. My mother's oil and watercolor paintings were displayed in our home, while my father explored sculpture later in life. They were always encouraging." Stephanie's sister, Valerie Smith, is an equine painter and also a member of DCAA.

In high school, Stephanie won a scholarship to take figure drawing classes at the Art Center School, which was a stepping stone to majoring in fine arts



One day as she walked around her house, Stephanie was suddenly struck by all the nudes and portraits on her walls that she had painted over the years. She had an epiphany: "I really don't want to be surrounded by these people! Right then I made a conscious decision that I wanted to paint landscapes. Also, I knew that I wanted to be surrounded by peace, not the chaos of crowds or cityscapes."

Stephanie pursued this goal. In Portland, she discovered *plein air painting with a supportive community* of like-minded artists. "They invited me along on their outings. We shared ideas. It was inspiring to see how different artists interpreted the same scene in unique ways."

Stephanie's nature scenes are expressive and, for her, there's great importance in creating art that conveys a sense of serenity. "I believe we all need more calm in our lives. It's about balance and harmony. When you're painting on location, you're not just replicating a view—you're recording a memory. You're creating an artwork that holds not only the visual but the emotional mood of that exact place and time. It's about creating a connection to the vastness and peace of nature."

"Plein air is kind of like camping," Stephanie laughs. "You have to pack up everything you'll need and haul it to the site. It can be a real expedition." When she relocated to Madras, Stephanie brought her love of plein air painting to the high desert. "The climate here is much harsher than in the Willamette Valley," she admits. "Painting outside has more challenges—you're either hot, cold, or battling the wind. I take a lot of photos and make sketches outside, but I often finish paintings in the studio."

Stephanie teaches group classes at the Studio on 5th in Madras, focusing on acrylic painting, which she describes as an approachable and versatile medium for beginners. "Unlike oil, acrylic doesn't have strong fumes, which makes it ideal for shared spaces and quick learning." Still, Stephanie admits, "Outdoors or in my own studio, I'll always prefer oils. They just have a richness acrylic can't replicate." Recently, though, Stephanie's been revisiting watercolors. "Every new medium or technique brings

something fresh to my art," she says. "It's freeing to try something I might not master right away. It's all part of growing."

When asked if she had any obstacles in her artistic pursuits, Stephanie recalled an early critique from a gallery owner who advised her to find a distinct style before she would be ready to present her paintings. The comment kept Stephanie from sharing her work professionally for many years. "I took it so hard back then," she admits.

A breakthrough moment for Stephanie occurred while participating in one of her first plein air art shows in Portland, where she sold two paintings—a surprise that boosted her fledgling confidence. "A young man purchased one of my first landscape paintings, saying he was giving it to his wife for their anniversary because the scene reminded him of a place they loved to visit together. At that moment I realized my art doesn't have to be perfect to be meaningful and special to someone. Now I say to my students: 'Explore and enjoy painting, and share with others! Someone else will find something meaningful in your vision.'"

## **ART TIPS & TECHNIQUES**

# **Developing a Good Vocabulary of Brushwork**

One of the best ways to accomplish this kind of mystery in your paint surface is by developing and employing a good vocabulary of brushwork. Simply put, learn to put paint on in different ways.

Think of your brushstrokes like words and find other varied ways to make them. Here are some suggestions:

- Try painting strokes at different speeds and observe differences in quality.
- Switch brushes often so that you can learn the unique mark-making of each.
- Change the angle or direction of your strokes.
- Vary your pressure.
- Experiment with non-brush painting tools. Think: carving tools, palette knives, squeegees, steel wool, etc.

The more variation and mystery in your surface, the longer people will spend looking at your work. It keeps them engaged, discovering something new every time they see it.



## **ART THERAPY**

#### The Treasure of Time:

With a close observation of the rhythms in the progression of Time, we can find a truly divine sport with its vibrations appearing as questions and answers in awareness. Some say that Time is solely that of a creative love story, while others simply dismiss the entire concept. What do you believe or experience with the movements of Time?

In making our time "worth" our time, we can find ourselves dedicating more and more time. There are blessings within the creative invitation to the 'Odyssey' of Time, which bring questions that defy all answers, yet provide a boon of courage and splendor.

Let's consider the pathway of Time to see where it leads: First, is time truly measurable or is this simply a creative story that we're telling ourselves while time remains as it ever was – secretive, unending, and to some extent unknowable? Do the qualities we notice in each period simply reflect our own changing subjective experiences? Does time change or do we change? Does the delineation matter?

The seasons occur in a cycle, each dramatically different from the others; the patterned transition from one to the next being a movement marker in the passage of time. Is time a line or is it a circle, or another shape entirely? What time is it? What time will it be? The prospect that each day can be new, or at least we can be new in how we approach each day, is thoroughly fascinating.

Our gifts of time hold promptings as if playfully anticipating upcoming desires and needs in accordance with an arising of recognition: A respectful regard for the dictates of time, along with our keen awareness of the flowing conscientiousness required, suggests true stewardship.

The pure brilliance and value of the gems of time invite our smiles and offer immense blessings of meaning and joy. Much like a charming child, the purity of time seems to create silken sensations that become powerful etchings in our memory. With all the flourishing, dynamic movements that are so distinctive of Time, we are better able to dedicate time to time.

Time can be very kind! If we treat time with respect, then time is our friend and it really doesn't matter whether it goes by quickly or draws itself out to eternity. How can time be good or bad? It's a second, an hour, a day, a night.

Who is it that colors time all these different ways? Who is painting this very moment, right now, with different images and visions? If we nourish a tendency to blame others for the way we fill our time, our good times will always be brief. How we treat time is very significant. We can take this time and make it ours, make it valuable, make it divine.
